Graham holds a BSc (Hons) in Psychology from the University of London, an MSc in Occupational Psychology from the University of Nottingham, a Masters in Clinical Neuropsychology (Vice-Chancellor's International Scholarship) from Macquarie University, and a PhD in Psychology earned with a double-scholarship award from the University of Queensland. Additionally, he holds a diploma in Stress Management Training and is registered with the British Psychological Society as a Qualified Ability & Personality Test User (Levels 1 & 2); he also holds the Euro Test User Certificate (European Federation of Psychological Associations). Graham's contribution to psychology has been recognized by the British Psychological Society where he is a Chartered Psychologist & Associate Fellow, and holds full membership of the Division of Occupational Psychology and the Division of Neuropsychology. In addition, he is an Associate Fellow with the Hong Kong Psychological Society, a Chartered Scientist with the UK science council and a member of the World Federation for Neuro Rehabilitation.

After early managerial experience in retail and work with the UK Civil Service Headquarters Training Operations, Graham spent a number of years in Dubai as a Human Resource Management Lecturer for the University of Leicester's MBA in HRM and the University of Sheffield's MSc in HRM. At the same time, he set up and managed a human resource training and consulting business specialising in psychometric assessment. Prior to relocating to Australia for his PhD, he returned to the UK and worked with a psychometric test publisher as a trainer, consultant and Head of Quality Control. During his time in Australia he set up PsyAsia International in Hong Kong and Singapore and remains director of the company. His experience in the human resource field has seen him work on locally-relevant workplace issues in, for example, the United Kingdom, Australia, United Arab Emirates, Oman, Saudi Arabia, Nigeria, Hong Kong, Macau, China, Malaysia, Thailand, Brunei, Vietnam, Philippines, Indonesia and Singapore. He has worked with local, multi-national and government entities, including Cathay Pacific Airways, Citibank, ING, HSBC, Intercontinental Hotels, Dubai Duty Free, Telekom Malaysia, Sony Electronics, Li & Fung, Hewitt Associates, Hay Group, GlaxoSmithKline, Emirates Petroleum, the Hong Kong Institute for Vocational Education, the Government of Macao and Singapore Government (e.g., Prime Minister's Office, MINDEF, Ministry of Education, Police Force & Narcotics Bureau, Civil Service College, Ministry of Home Affairs).

Graham's training in Clinical Neuropsychology and experience as a clinician has seen him working with multidisciplinary teams in renowned teaching hospitals with rotations including neurology, traumatic brain injury, aged care and paediatrics. What is learned about the brain from patients with brain impairment contributes to our knowledge of how the undamaged brain works and Graham applies this in organisational settings with his knowledge of, for example, how attention, memory, language processes, perception and executive skills impact individual and organisational performance. This, and his additional training in standardized psychometric tests for neuropsychological applications is unique in those practicing organisational psychology.

With retail, travel and consultancy management experience Graham is able to strike a balance between ground-breaking research and its practical application and relay training in an easy to understand format. Under his management, PsyAsia International has received 5 International Quality & Excellence Awards, was nominated for the 2017 Asian Enterprise Awards and in 2018 named Singapore Business Awards Best Psychometric & Business Psychology Consultancy and won the HRD Service Provider Award for Psychometric Assessment.

Outside of work, Graham appreciates the opportunity to give back to society and his voluntary work has been recognised by the British Red Cross Society with the award of Honorary Life Membership, and by Wesley Hospital, Australia where he was nominated for the "Ideals in Action" award.
